Exams coming up?

Here's our top 3 revision tips

Exams may be just around the corner and revising can be difficult at the best of times. It is easy to develop bad revision habits, so here are the top 3 revision tips from the Additional Learning Support team to support your achievement and minimise stress.



1. Get organised – it can be difficult to fit revision around work, college and family life so use a revision timetable to focus on what needs to be done. Block out times you are available to study (be realistic) and times you aren't. Add what needs to be completed in each revision session, breaking down topics helps, then display your plan somewhere you can see it (and therefore more likely to stick to it!). Electronic revision timetables are also available; check out [Get Revising](#) and the [BBC Bitesize](#) for some free planners, or apps like Timetable or My Study Life.

2. Repetition – don't just revise a topic once and move on. Complete regular refreshers and pay extra attention to areas you are weaker at or the topics your mock assessments flagged up.

Keep shortening your revision notes each time to revisit a topic so your mind continues to interact with what needs to be remembered.





3. Create a positive mindset - Set manageable goals that will help you stay motivated and get something out of every revision session. Start each study session with a positive affirmation such as, 'today, I am going to achieve...' Remember, sitting exams can be a stressful time and if you are struggling it is important to talk to someone.

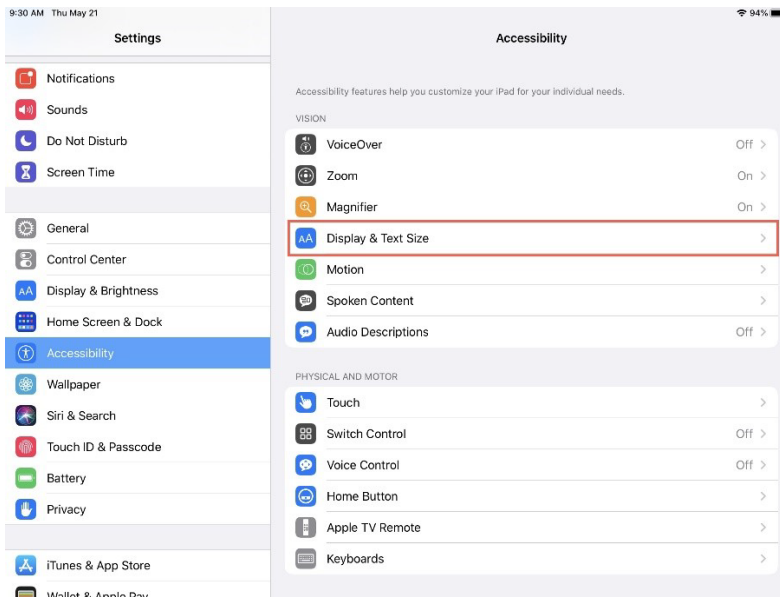

Could technology help you learn more effectively?

Assistive and Accessible Technology - What's the difference?

Assistive Technology is any device, software or equipment that is designed for a specific task and helps people work around any challenges or disabilities they have whether cognitive or physical. An example of assistive technology could be a reader pen, which is a portable tool used to scan then read words aloud (or listen to the text using headphones). This is useful when reading textbooks or in exams (but must be your normal way of working before use in exams).





Accessible Technology is technology that's been designed with the needs of many different users in mind. It's technology with built-in features that can be customised to maximise potential in the workplace, in the classroom and in your free time. An example of accessible technology includes your smart phone which has features such as

changing text size, text to speech features and voice control to speak commands to your phone.

Benefits of technology:

- Prevent work-related injuries e.g., repetitive strain injury
- Provide alternative communication aids e.g., using voice recognition software
- Increase productivity by completing tasks faster or multitasking e.g., listen to text on the go, dictating your shopping list whilst walking the dog.
- Promote independence and autonomy e.g., reading independently
- Facilitate memory and recall e.g., by listening rather than reading if you are an auditory learner

Designed by industry experts, WorldSkills UK competitions help young people grow personally and professionally developing their technical and employability skills and boosting their confidence.

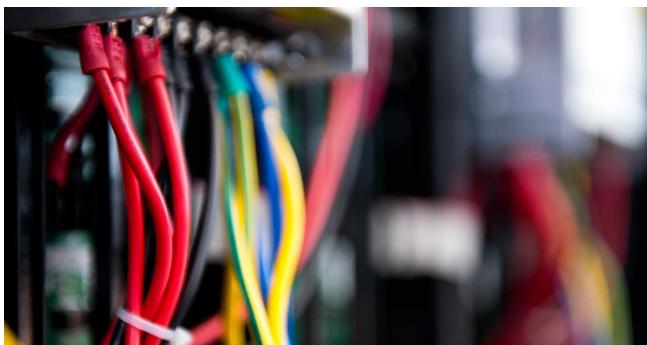
If competitors impress at the national final, they could be in with a chance of representing the UK in the 'Skills Olympics' in France in 2024.
