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Did you know that apprenticeships are graded? Whilst your GCSE grades will have been 1-9 or A*-F, your apprenticeship grade will come in the form of pass, merit or distinction.

Aim to stand out from the crowd by earning a distinction. Not

sure how? All the details are in the apprenticeship assessment plans accessed via the links in the table below.

Reasonable adjustments in the workplace

Did you know that employers have a legal responsibility to make reasonable adjustments in the workplace? And did you know that this requirement applies to all workers, including trainees, apprentices, contract workers and business partners?



It is important to know your rights at work and what support should be made available to you. A reasonable adjustment is an inexpensive change that can remove or reduce a disadvantage related to a long-term illness, a disability or difficulty. Some examples suggested by the British Dyslexia Association include:

- Printing information on coloured paper
- Giving instructions one at a time, slowly and clearly without distractions
- Encouraging the use of calendar and alarm features on phones
- Create a daily 'To do' list
- Ensure work areas are well lit

If the reasonable adjustments put in place by an employer are not sufficient, you may be eligible for government help through <u>Access to Work</u>. A factsheet can be

found <u>here</u>. An Access to Work grant could pay for special equipment, help getting to and from work or dyslexia awareness training for colleagues, BSL interpreters or support managing your mental health at work.

Remember, an employer will benefit from having a diverse workforce both financially and in terms of workplace culture. Neurodiverse people bring unique skills that can give a company a competitive edge such as creativity, innovation and strong problem solving.

Start with belief in yourself and the rest will follow

Confidence is the key to all learning. If you give yourself the chance to learn and accept that mistakes are part of the process, your confidence will naturally grow. The first step to improving is believing that you can.

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Take your time

People are often so keen to find out their results that they rush to answer the questions. Take your time and read the questions thoroughly. There's no timer or progress bar so you can take your time to think. Take it at your own pace, have a break and come back whenever you need to.

This industry recognised five-day course provides competence-based training and assessment in the selection, use, maintenance, and inspection of electrical equipment in potentially explosive atmospheres.

Applications are now open for Screwfix Trade Apprentice 2023. The competition is back for its 9th year and coincides with National Apprenticeship Week.



The Screwfix Trade Apprentice 2023 champion will receive a career-boosting trade bundle worth £10,000, including £5,000 of tools, a £3,000 training budget, and £2,000 worth of technology.

Entry to Screwfix Trade Apprentice 2023 is open to all apprentices who are enrolled at college and either have a part-time placement with an employer or are a full-time college student. Apprentices can apply themselves or be nominated by their training provider, college or employer. All applicants must be over the age of 16. The closing date to enter is Sunday 19th February.
